

The Freedom Tiles- How local artists create history and define a sense of place.

Since 1970 local artists in Freedom have been creating images that are printed on ceramic tiles as memorabilia for Freedom and to celebrate Freedom Old Home Week. But the tiles go beyond just being a collector's item. The tiles record images that become part of the Town's history and help define the sense of place that is Freedom. For this reason, these tiles are important and as part of a collection, preserved.



The Freedom Historical Society has long felt that it is important to establish and maintain strong connections with the "younger generation" to instill knowledge and interest in our town's history and residents – past and present. We have worked closely over the years with Mrs. Kareen Briggs, the 5/6 grade teacher at Freedom Elementary School. In December 2022 the students created tree "ornaments" based on Freedom's people and places.



FHS "Special Projects" explained.

The primary functions of the Freedom Historical Society is to maintain the collection and operate the museum while educating the public about local history. These functions are paid for by regular memberships and donations. These donations are "unrestricted", meaning the Board can use these funds for any one of these operational functions.

However, the Board also undertakes **"special projects"** which have targeted funding; these donations are "restricted" and can only be spent on the specific project for which the money was raised. The FHS is required to track and account for the money spent of these special projects. We continue to seek donations from our members, conduct fundraisers, and apply for grants to support these key projects. Here is a list of our Special Projects for the coming year and please give as generously as you can to your priority areas.

1. Archival Project: This is an ongoing project that involves entering the museum collection into the museum software called "Past Perfect". This database allows users to find collected items, read details about them, see a photograph of the item and where the item is stored. But the beauty is that this software allows users to see connections between people and places which helps contribute to their place in the story of Freedom itself. It's a large web of related information.



The plan is to make this database available to the public at some point; right now, queries can be made primarily through Board members and specific researchers working on projects. This project is funded by private donors and a modest donation from Town taxpayers. This is an ongoing project with no end date; fundraising is also on-going. Please give an extra gift this year to the Archival Project.

2. The Snow Roller Project: This project started in 2021 when an old snow roller was acquired from Smiling Hill Farm in Westbrook Maine. The intent is to bring this piece of history back to its original shape so that Freedom will be the only NH town to have a snow roller and a snow roller shed.



The shed was previously preserved by the Freedom Heritage Commission and is on the State of NH list of historic resources. There are

pictures of snow rollers being used by the road crew in Freedom's past. This project is a joint effort between the Freedom Heritage Commission and the Freedom Historical Society; the Historical Society is responsible for the restoration of the snow roller. The projected end date for this project is 2024; fundraising has been completed as far as we can tell. Thanks to generous members the original goal has been met.

3. Allard House Project: This project involves several repairs and corrections to the Allard house to reduce moisture and mildew problems and restore the front porch posts to their original design.



It is anticipated that the majority of the work can e done in 2023, with a 2024 completion date. Fundraising has been completed for this project.

4, Climate Control Project: Moisture and heat fluctuations are the enemy of sensitive historical items including artwork, deeds, journals, letters, leather goods, etc. Since the Board is responsible for preservation of these items in the Freedom collection, the immediate need is for a climate-controlled room for storage.



Other small museums in our area have, or are, undertaking a similar project. Fortunately, the lowest level of the Works barn provides space to construct such a room. Work will begin in 2023 with a planned completion date of 2024. \$6,000 has been raised to date through individual gifts in 2022 and a Henney Grant in 2023. We have \$8,000 to go in 2023. Can you help fund this vital project by contributing a special gift to Climate Control this year?

5. Freedom Houses Project: This project involves compiling historical information on the private homes in Freedom. The Freedom Heritage Commission did this for historic public buildings in Freedom and has an interest in continuing the project for historical homes. The Historical Society is compiling historical data and putting it in standard format for future use by FHS and the Heritage Commission, as appropriate.



FHS undertook work on this project in 2020 and completed what could be down with town records, etc., short of researching deeds. Deed research is the heavy lifting of this project and FHS will be seeking funds to continue the project. For now, this project is on hold, but funds are needed to continue the project in 2024. Can you help?

 Public Education Project: The NH Humanities Council funds speakers to help with the education programs that FHS presents each year. NHHC usually funds 2-3 programs for us annually: the rest of the programs are paid for by FHS funds.



Because the NHHC funds have a targeted use they are restricted to payment for the speakers only; hence we must track them separate from general funds. Funding for these programs is sought each year, so it is an on-going process. If you are interested in maintaining a full schedule of education programs, contribute a gift over and above membership to the Public Education Fund.

Folks take pride in maintaining a full collection, but we have no record of how many people have attained that. The Historical Society does have one of the fullest collections and it is on display in the kitchen of the Allard House. Read on to understand several aspects of the Freedom tile collection.

The Tiles: Tiles have been produced now for 57 years and have included 45 different subjects. Ten of these subjects were private house (some gone). The village square and the First Christian Church were represented three times each and the following were represented twice over the years: School House Hill, Loon Lake, Freedom Library, Freedom Historical Society, the grist mill, the fountain and the Federal building. That leaves 15 subjects that were unique from the above.

What you may not realize that in 1975 there were two tiles and since 1976 was the Bicentennial there were four tiles. One additional "anomaly" was a tile produced in 1955, designed by John Holmgren; this appears to be a rare item, but the image was re-done on the 1975 ?? tile.

Tile Artists (22): Below is the "head count" of how many tiles each of the 22 artists have contributed. There is no doubt that we are all grateful for the work these artists have donated to help celebrate Freedom Old Home week.


